Overview

The study of Geography is concerned with the Earth in two ways: as the science of interaction between natural elements of the environment (weather, plants, soils, and landforms) and as the science of the distribution and activities of the Earth's population in response to social and environmental factors. Systematic studies in Geography examine the locations, distributions, arrangements, and associations between groups of interrelated features. In contrast, regional studies examine the totality of geographic phenomena in a particular area.
