Mennonite Studies focuses on closely examining the history, religion and culture of the Mennonites. It is an interdisciplinary program that allows students to take courses in many areas including geography, history, religion and conflict resolution studies. This program is not directed at any career in particular, though Mennonite Studies majors develop the skills attendant to the variety of courses they study.
