## Overview

A second or third language can be used as primary or as auxiliary skills in a career. A major in French Studies, German Studies or Spanish Studies provides the skills sought after by numerous employers, such as the education system, government, the mass media (radio, television, newspapers), museums, the travel and tourism industry, as well as businesses or companies with overseas offices. With further education, students with a degree in French Studies, German Studies or Spanish Studies can go on to teach in primary, secondary, high schools, or in universities, or become translators and interpreters. In Canada, being bilingual in French and English provides an excellent advantage when applying for careers in the public sector.
